• Offer Chinese language and cultural classes for children from 3 to 18 years old

Program origin: The program was founded in 1973.

Instructors' and administration's expectations for the program: Staff are parents who are unpaid volunteers helping the children learn Chinese

How the program determines the language background and language proficiency of students: Oral interviews

Students' attitudes toward the language varieties they speak: Students are proud that they can speak Chinese.

Levels of language proficiency reached by the end of the program: Students become proficient listeners, speakers, readers, and writers of Mandarin.

Special challenges

Challenges the program has experienced:

- Lack of permanent location
- High dropout rate for older students
- Finding qualified teachers

Comments: Like many weekend language schools, our biggest challenge is staying at the same location for as long as possible. We moved to a new location this year which was a big hassle.

Our parents are all enthusiastic about school functions and want their children to learn Chinese well. Our school also provides adult classes (Tai-Chi, pottery, badminton). Chinese school is a social gathering/bonding place for parents. Many parents look forward to seeing their Chinese friends on Saturday afternoon in Chinese school.

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
