Program Description

Purposes and goals of the program: The Dante Alighieri Society of Massachusetts is a non-profit organization whose objective is to promote and foster Italian language and culture. We offer language courses for children from Pre-K to grade 12 on Saturday mornings from September through May. We offer adult classes on Tuesday and Wednesday evenings throughout the year.

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Type of program: immersion, partial immersion, foreign language program, Saturday academy, and extracurricular club

Parents

Parents' expectations for the program: The parents expect that their children will learn to speak Italian and develop an appreciation for the culture.

Staff

Instructors' making administration's expectations for the program: The staff are committed to making the learning experience as fun as possible. We know that it is a Saturday program, and we want the children and parents to enjoy themselves.

How the program identifies heritage speakers: Oral interview

How the program determines the language background and language proficiency of students: The instructors interview new students to see what language proficiency they have in the first few weeks of the school year.

Percentage of students who complete the program: 50%

Percentage of students who continue to study the heritage language after completing the program: 15%

Possible reasons for student withdrawal: Other school or sports activities with time conflicts.

Instructors

Number of instructors in the program: 12

Languages in which instructors are proficient: Italian and English

Proficiency level: All of our instructors are fluent in Italian, and most are native speakers.

Credentials: 20% of the teaching staff hold a teacher's certificate or license in any given state. Teachers are certified in Early childhood education and Italian language teaching. One teacher has a BA in Education and Engineering. Others have an MA in Education.

Professional development opportunities instructors have: Italian AP training, Italian Consulate teaching seminars

Professional development opportunities instructors need: curricular planning and course development

Total contact hours per week: 2 hours per week

Times per week: 1 class session per week

Student grouping: Students in the children's program are grouped by language

aptitude.

Hours devoted to language teaching: 100% of the time the spoken language is Italian.

Hours devoted to culture teaching: Culture is addressed as part of the subject matter.

Skills developed by the program: Heritage Italian

Heritage language skills: listening, speaking, reading, and writing

Levels of language proficiency reached by the end of the program: The goal is for students to reach fluency in Italian.
