Why do you think Bellini doesn't want to teach Mirette?

[Anticipated responses: This activity can be dangerous, because there is the possibility of falling. Somebody who does it seriously might want to do something a little more daring or difficult each time they do it, and

then it can become quite dangerous.]

Page 7
"Mirette watched him every day. He would slide his feet onto the wire, cast his eyes ahead, and cross without ever looking down, as if in a trance."



Let's do what Bellini is doing. Stand up and pretend that there is a narrow wire in front of you. Cast your eyes straight ahead, as if you are in a trance. Don't look down!



Why do you think Bellini never looks down?



[Anticipated response: Open, but that must be the way to keep from falling.]

C. CLOSING DISCUSSION



Think about Bellini when he started walking on the high wire with the spotlight on him. What happened to him? [Anticipated response: He froze; he couldn't take one more step.] Now think about what happened when Mirette reached out her arms to him. What happened? [Anticipated response: He could walk. He faced his fear.] Sometimes we need other people to help us face our fears. Think of something you used to be afraid of, that you aren't anymore. Did someone help you face your fear, like Mirette helped Bellini.
